

It is gone. It will never come back.












The Big Picture

The first day at Cape Cove Beach, I didn't see well. The next day I returned, and my Dad's advice came back to me. I took a step back and made The Big Picture.












To each his own.






















A New Career

Le Grand Carrousel


One of the best ways to experience the holidays in Europe is a Christkindlmarkt (Christmas market for the German speaking world), with stalls selling local snacks and gifts, live music by local choirs and orchestras, and carnival-worthy entertainment like Ferris Wheels and Carrousels. Nestled next to the Cathedral in Strasbourg, France, the 1900 Carrousel wasn't quite ready for the waiting children, but it was ready for my camera on a cold December morning.

The lessons learned from these photographs are simple. The first is your Dad usually has great advice, you just have to remember what he said and then when to apply his advice. The second is you will probably not hit the photographic jackpot on your first visit. Returning to a location usually results in better photographic results because you have already seen the obvious and are ready to begin to make better images.

He decided to pull off the highway about a hundred yards or so (to minimize road noise) and record a couple of podcasts.
