


WELCOME TO THE LIPKA JOURNAL AUGUST 2025


A Mostly True Story


Tommy's first real job was at the shipyards in Mobile doing whatever no one else wanted to do for minimum wage.

Foreman Frank then told Tommy to go to the storeroom and have Leon issue him two bags of clean sawdust.






Hydro-Logic Quiet Water



























Postcards from the Creative Journey














We continue because Projects come from Projects.


Between Destinations
